Aida Bound, also known as Grandma, “Teacher” and the Hat Lady, was born June 25, 1937. She lived in Wenatchee, WA for the past 17 years. Grandma passed away on October 7, 2023 at age 86. She grew up in New York, moved to Washington, DC with her then husband and children in 1970 where she remained until she moved to Washington state in 2005. She worked in the peace movement for many years before obtaining her BA from American University in her 40s, followed by a Masters degree in Social Work soon thereafter. Later in her career she worked as an adjunct professor at Howard University in Washington, DC.

Grandma touched many lives throughout her long life. She particularly loved teenagers and worked with them as a social worker and most recently as an Avid volunteer at Wenatchee High School. She was always involved in the community in which she lived and blossomed in Wenatchee where she won the Wenatchee Civil Rights and Social Justice Award. She worked for Home Health and had a business organizing. She led many classes for multilingual adults learning English, started and ran the “Hat Project” for many years as well as volunteered her time and skills in many other areas.

Aida is survived by her siblings: Charles, Alva, John and Virginia, her three daughters and spouses: Dana Page, Lea Page (Ray Kuntz) and Brooke Page (Chad McBride), and grandchildren: Kenneth Page-Brooks, Nina Kuntz,

Thomas Kuntz, Tara McBride and Liam McBride.
