Marlene Dymont, died peacefully in Christ on Friday, January 27, 2012 after a long battle with Alzheimer's. We are so thankful to know she is resting in the arms of God. She was born on May 15, 1936 in Wenatchee to Ernst and Alfreda Kruse (Sinclair). Marlene lived in Wenatchee until the family moved to Bellingham where she graduated from high school and started working at KVOS TV Station. She then worked in one of the local banks where she met and married Roy Hendrickson, moving back to Wenatchee in 1961 with daughter Anna. They had two more children from this marriage, Susan and Eric. Marlene started working at Keokuk in Rock Island where she met and then married Gordon Dymont in November of 1971. Their passion was golf and they spent a lot of time playing and competing at the Rock Island Golf Course. Marlene and Gordon were married for almost 34 years before his death in 2005. She was a very devoted wife, mother and grandmother and child of God. She was devoted to her church home, Grace Lutheran Church in Wenatchee, where she was the first baby baptized in that congregation. She worked as a bookkeeper for many years, of which 17 years were attributed to Grace Lutheran until her retirement in 1998. Marlene is survived by children Anna Short (Donald) Susan Hendrickson, Eric Hendrickson (Jennifer) and step children from Gordon, David Dymont (Penni), Susan Tiffany (Keith) and Joyce Harris (Berle). She had 13 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren. She is preceded in death by her husband Gordon, mother and father and
